Superintendent Stanley of the Water Works Department reported to Council that six filter beds at the Water Filtration Plant had been found to be defective. Engineer Chester of Pittsburg estimated that to rebuild the filter beds it would cost \$1582.60.

Fire Chief Held, called attention to the advisability of the city adopting of the building code at this time, and requested President Barnard to name a Committee of Councilmen to confer with other city officials upon the question. Thereupon the President named Messrs. Grubb, H. T. Miller, and Penick.

Mr. G. W. Henry, City Park Commissioner suggested that the Council members meet with the Park Commission to read the report and to decide on the future construction, etc. He also requested that Council name a park committee to work with the commission.

Encampment
of Spanish
War Vet-
erans.

Grubb spoke of the proposed encampment of the United Spanish War Veterans to be held in the city July 1, 2, 3, 4, and the big Fourth of July celebration for the city. He requested for the Committee the use of portions of certain streets which intersect with Main Street upon which it is desired to locate concessions. It was stated that there positively would be no gambling or other objectionable features introduced. The request for the use of the street was granted by motion of Lower, seconded by Penick.

Council decided to meet with Park Commisxioner Thursday evening, which motion was agreed to meet Thursday evening to inspect plans and specifications for the proposed overhead bridge at Lincoln Avenue.

Securing
of Parking
places
for auto-
mobiles.

Lower reported that he had made some progress regarding the securing appropriate parking places for automobiles and other vehicles. He also called attention to a request of the Fire Chief, that some arrangements be made whereby autos would not be allowed parked on South Liberty Ave. between Main Street and Ash Street and on South Arch Avenue from Main to Market Street. With machines parked here, the street cars stopping the thorofores are blocked for traffic making it very dangerous. With motion of Grubb, seconded by Lower the matter was referred to the Street Committee and Police Department for recommendations as to an ordinance to regulate parking of vehicles at such points as deemed advisable.
