July 16, 1917

To the Honorable Council of the City of Alliance, Ohio.

Gentlemen: - As the contract under Ordinance Number 1897

An ordinance granting to Frank McCort, the privilege of placing at divers places on the streets and alleys of the City of Alliance, Ohio, cans of galvanized iron for the purpose of collecting waste paper. Passed April 5th, 1915.

will expire April 5th, 1918.

I desire to submit for your careful consideration the following proposition for an extension or renewal at the expiration of this ordinance, as it will take some time to get same in good shape.

I will agree to furnish the City with good neat cans, the size and style to be left to the discretion of the Director of Public Service, in consideration of the Council renewing the franchise for a period of five years. I will agree to pay for fifteen cans the sum of Fifty Dollars, per annum and for an additional can the sum of \$3.50 each, per annum, the City to take care of same in the way of repairs and keeping same in a sanitary condition.
