Dear Sir:-

Communication from State Board of Health stating condition of present Water Works System

On January 11, 1918, one of our assistant engineers visited Alliance, examined the water purification plant of the city and conferred with you and other city officials with reference to the water supply situation. At the time of the visit samples of water were collected. The results of examination of these samples showed that the water purification plant was producing a satisfactory effluent at the time of sampling. There are, however, several unsatisfactory conditions attending the water supply and water works system of the city which render extremely doubtful the continuous department therefore is not prepared to issue certificates to the railroads entering Alliance whereby the use of the public water supply of the city on passenger trains is permitted.

The principal features which demand attention are as follows:

1st. Under existing conditions the capacity of the water purification plant (six million gallons per 24 hours) is taxed to supply the demand of the City. Increase in rates of operation above the nominal capacity have resulted in production of an unsatisfactory effluent. A further marked increase in demand is to be expected as a result of the establishment of the plant of the Morgan Engineering Company at Alliance and the accompanying increase in population of the City. Unless the daily consumption can be kept within the safe capacity of the plant which seems doubtful the plant capacity must be increased by the addition of basin and filter capacity.

2nd. The filtered water reservoir provided for by plans approved by the State Board of Health February 22, 1917, must be constructed to provide storage of filtered water and permit fluctuations in pumpage without affecting rates of operation of the plant.

3rd. Meters on services should be installed generally in an effort to reduce the abnormal consumption of water.

4th. As soon as possible the services of a competent man to take charge of the operation of the plant should be secured as without the most careful supervision, efficiency is not to be expected. Owing to the scarcity of technically trained men of this kind, it may be necessary to make an additional salary provision for this position.

5th. The connection to permit the pumpage of unfiltered river water to the mains should be entirely removed as previously stated in our letter to you of May 29, 1917.

6th. To prevent local condemnation of the raw water the supply should be obtained from a point upstream from Deer Creek and Tail Run as advised in our previous communication of August 9, 1917.

I trust that the gravity of the present situation is fully realized by the officials of your city and that there will be no delay in proceeding with the important improvements above outlined.

We shall be pleased to hear from you as soon as this matter has been thoroughly considered by you and the City Council.

The following communication was read from the Alliance-Sebring Central Labor Union:

Hon. Mayor C. S. Westover,
Alliance, Ohio.

Dear Sir:-

The Alliance-Sebring Central Labor Union have discussed for some time the advisibility of having a fifteen minute schedule of the Stark Electric Railroad Company, extending from Rockhill Road on State Street, to the Mahoning County Line on East Summit Street, and have adopted the following resolution hoping that by praying on the Hon. Mayor and to the City Council that same could be accomplished.

RESOLUTION:

Owing to the fact that our manufacturing plants are located mostly outside of the residence districts, and are now giving employment to a large number of men, and preparing to handle a great many more, and many of these men living beyond a reasonable walking distance from said shops: Therefore the Alliance-Sebring Central Labor Union respectfully requests the Hon. Mayor and our City Council to use their good offices in influencing the Stark Electric Railroad Company to arrange a schedule running cars over the division from Rockhill Road on State Street to Mahoning County Line on East Summit Street, every fifteen (15) minutes with direct connection to West Main Street Line with Transfer.

Knowing that this move will be greatly appreciated by the Laboring men, and at the same time would increase the revenue to justify the service, we would appreciate it very much if you would give this immediate action.
