

Council met in regular session with President Barnard in the Chair.

The roll being called, the following answered to their names: Messrs. Grubb, Lower, Merts, Harry Miller, James Miller, Penick, Weaver.

On motion of Lower, seconded by James G. Miller, the reading of the minutes was dispensed with.

Inquiry made as to curb markets.

A Committee composed of Mrs. J. E. Vaugh, Mrs. Thad Bailey and Mrs. Perry F. King were present and given the privilege of addressing the Councilmanic body.

Mrs. Vaugh stated that farmers were making inquiries as to whether the City expected to maintain curb markets this year, as they desired to plant accordingly.

Attention was called to the report of a curb market located at Portland, Oregon, which has been very sucessful. Here the work is in charge of a market master and an assistant, and it was suggested that Alliance should have such an official.

On motion of Lower, seconded by Grubb the President was instructed to appoint a Committee to investigate the curb market proposition; which motion was agreed to. President Barnard appointed Messrs. Lower, Weaver and Penick.

Food administ-rator ask public to pay expen-ses.

Mrs. Thad Bailey, local food administrator called attention to the work to be done nationally, in the state, county and city, all of which officials she stated worked without compensation. This she said they did willingly and faithfully but felt that as the movement was a public one that the public should pay the expenses incident to the service.

The proposition of Mrs. Thad Bailey was referred to the Finance Committee for consideration.

Patton called attention to fire apparatus.

Mr. J. H. Patton called attention to the need of a new fire fighting apparatus, also that it was necessary to increase the rates of the Hospital to meet the increased cost of food provisions.

The matter was referred to the Fire and Police and Finance Committee.

Finance Comm. re-commended payment of bills.

City Auditor spoke of a number of bills submitted by the Health Board to a recent smallpox quarantine; which were referred to the Finance Committee.

Weaver moved, seconded by Grubb that the reports of the Committee of Railways and Telegraphs on Ordinance 41-A be reconsidered. The question being on the agreeing of the reconsideration by vote, whereby Ordinance 41-A was approved by the Committee on Railways and Telegraphs; which motion was agreed to.

The question being on the agreeing to the report of the Committee on Ordinance 41-A; the report of the Committee was agreed to and the Ordinance was recommitted by the Committee on Railways and Telegraphs.

Platting Comm. rec-ommend passage of 23-A Solicitor instructed to prepare ord.

The Committee on Platting, to whom was referred Ordinance 23-A submitted their report and recommended passage of same.

Grubb moved seconded by Lower, that the Solicitor be instructed to prepare an Ordinance to vacate an alley adjoining Warners Mill; which motion was agreed to.

Ord. 55-A read 1st time.
