

MONDAY MAY 27, 1918.

Council met in adjourned session with President Barnard in the chair.

The roll being called, the following members answered to their names: Grubb, Lower, Merts, Harry Miller, James Miller, Penick, Weaver. Present 7. Absent 0.

Mr. J. M. Hanson of Youngstown, Secretary of the Community Service Society addressed Council on the subject of municipal lodging houses. A motion of Weaver, seconded by Grubb, a vote of thanks was extended to Mr. Hanson for his extensive remarks.

Assessment claimed to be excessive.

City Solicitor Shettler on behalf of James I. Rickard, called the attention of Council to the improvement assessments made against 180 feet of property butting on Vine Street; the said assessment was deemed excessive by the owner.

Referred to the Assessment Committee.

Claim against the parking of autos on Market & Arch Streets made.

Considerable time was consumed in discussing the recent movement to rid the business section of Main Street of objective stands and display. The City Solicitor stated that Messrs. Myron White, Albert Bradshaw and A. L. Cope had filed objections to the regulations relating to the parking of automobiles and other vehicles on East Market Street between Freedom and Linden Avenues and South Arch Avenue and Main Street to the first Alley south of Main Street. The objectors claimed that the business is damaged by the enforcement of the ordinance to regulate the parking of automobiles.

The matter was referred to the Committee on Streets and Alleys.

Petition for 20% increase in salaries made by the Water Works employees.

The City Solicitor stated that in his opinion Council under the existing state laws did not have the right to grant the raise of fares as proposed in the pending ordinance. The Solicitor also stated that the city was still awaiting a decision from the state utility commission on the on the light rate question.
