

THURSDAY, AUG. 19th, 1918.

Service Director, McConnell called Council's attention to the fact that a considerable number of residents whose homes were just outside the city limits have been having sewer service, some for a number of years, for which they had not paid the city their annual rental of five dollars per year.

On motion of Grubb the Service Director was instructed to furnish the City Solicitor the list of the delinquents and the City Solicitor to enter suit against those who had failed to pay.

## RESOLUTION.

Resolution  
to provide  
Houses for  
Industrial  
Workers.

WHEREAS, The United States Housing Corporation, Organized under the laws of the State of New York, acting by the authority of the President of the United State, and the Secretary of Labor, has acquired certain tracts of land located in the North West and North East section of the City of Alliance, Ohio, for the purpose of improving such Real Estate and building thereon Houses, and providing homes for the Industrial Workers engaged in industries connected with, and essential to the National defense, and their families, whose services are essential to War needs, during the continuation of the existing War, all as fully authorized and provided for by War Housing Act as amended, passed by the Sixty-Fifth Congress of the United States, and approved May 16th, 1918, and,

WHEREAS, it is desirable and necessary for the proper carrying out of the plans of the Federal Government, in providing houses and homes for such Industrial workers, that the City of Alliance, through it's Council Officers and Agents, co-operate with the United States Housing Corporation in carrying out the plans for the accomplishment of the purposes stated above.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Council of the City of Alliance, Ohio, that so far as it lies within the power of the Council of said Municipality, it will co-operate with, aid and assist said The United States Housing Corporation in carrying out, as speedily as possible, all of it's plans for the proper housing of Industrial workers connected with, and essential to the National defense in the present emergency; that it will be as speedily as possible, pass all needed and necessary legislation for the annexations of territory, the construction of sanitary and storm sewers, the paving of Streets, laying sidewalks, and all other necessary improvements for the accomplishment of aforesaid purposes.
