The following Resolution was introduced:

RESOLUTION NO. 106-A.

Res. 106-A read first time and referred to Com. on streets & Alleys.

Mr. Grubb: Granting the United States Housing corporation the privilege and right to lay a sidetrack or switch across Liberty Avenue in the City of Alliance, Ohio.

Was read the first time. On motion of Harry T. Miller, seconded by L.L.Lower the bond to be given as provided for in Resolution 106-A by fixing it at \$10,000.

Which motion was agreed to. On motion of J. G. Miller, seconded by Lower the Resolution was referred to the committee on Streets and Alleys for immediate action.

RESOLUTION NO. 105-A.

Res. 105-A read first time & Ref. to Sts. & Alleys Com.

Mr. J. G. Miller: To remit building permit to the United States Housing Corporation in the construction of houses by it in the city of Alliance, Ohio. Was read the first time and referred to the Committee on Streets and Alleys for immediate action.
