

MONDAY, OCTOBER 7th, 1918.

Council met in regular session with president Barnard in the chair. Roll being called the following members answered to their names: Messrs. Grubb, Lower, Mertz, Harry Miller, James Miller, Penick and Weaver. Present seven, absent, none.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Increase of salary for the M. Court employees.

Judge M. C. Moore of the Municiple Court addressed the city Council urging an increase of salary for the Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Stenographer, and Bailiff. Was referred to the Finance Committee.

Mr. Harry Miller: An Ordinance fixing the salary of certain employes at the department of Public Service. Was read the first time and referred to the Finance Committee for immediate action.

Bad condition of S. Arch

Mr. Mertz spoke of the bad condition of the South Arch Avenue paving from Broadway to the first Alley South of that street. The matter was referred to Streets and Alleys Committee and the Director of Public Service

Bad condition of street lighting

Lower called the attention of the bad condition of the street lighting as are furnished by the Alliance Gas and Power Co. On motion of Lower the Director of Public Service was requested to hold up the bills for the payment of this service until conditions were made better. J. G. Miller stated that the Service Director and the lighting Committee had made a tour of the City and that the Service Director had stated that he would hold up the bills until the conditions were made better

On motion of Grubb seconded by Lower Council referred back to the fourth order of business the reports of the standing committees.
