At a meeting of the Board of Education, Alliance City School District held Feb. 20, 1919 the following motion was carried unanimously.

"Moved and seconded that this Board grant the request of the City Council to pay \$1,000 for the school year at the rate of \$100 per calendar month for any part of the school year from Sept. 1st, to June 30th inclusive, as it's share for the services of a school physician, his duties to be as outlined by the rules adopted by this Board at this meeting of Feb. 20, 1919."

Veneral

It was agreed at a joint meeting held by the Committee of Alliance City Council, Board of Health and School Board on February 21st, 1919 to appoint a physician who shall be paid \$1000 by the Board of Education and \$1400 by the Board of Health who should also serve as Officer of Veneral Clinic and be paid by the State Department of Public Health at the rate of \$60.00 per month.

There shall also be employed a nurse by the Board of Health at the rate of \$100. per month, who shall devote her time to the care of patients in the Veneral Clinic as directed by the Physician in charge and who will also devote part of her time to Public Health work at large.

There shall be made an appropriation of \$1000. for the purchase of equipment for the Venereal Clinic and a suitable place shall be rented for the location of the Venereal Clinic at a maximum cost of \$500 per year.

Total expense to be appropriated by Council for 1919 is \$4100 for maintaining a full time Health Officer and the upkeep of Venereal Clinic.
