TO THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ALLIANCE, STATE OF OHIO:

We the undersigned, owners of the number of feet or property set opposite our names below, the same being a majority of the foot frontage on Miller Avenue between State Street and the South Lot line of lot # 4426 and 4432 of said city, hereby respectfully petition your honorable board to pass the necessary legislation therefore and to improve said street between the points aforesaid by paving and by constructing a storm sewer, and that so much of the entire cost and expense thereof as may be lawfully assessed upon the adjacent, contiguous or other specially benefited lots and lands be assessed by a percentage of the tax value thereof or by the foot front or in proportion to the benefits that will result to said improvement upon the lots and lands abutting and bounding on said Miller Avenue between the points aforesaid, said assessments to be paid in annual installments or in cash, at the option of the owner of property assessed in the manner as provided by law for the levy and collection of assessments:
