The following communication was received from the United States Housing Corporation and was read:

April 19th, 1919.

President of the Common Council,  
City of Alliance, Ohio.

Dear Sir:

U. S. Housing Corp. desire to co-operate for a park in the noreast section of Alliance.

I have been authorized by the Town Planning Division of the U. S. Housing Corporation to take up with the Park Department or the city officials the question of a park area included in the Government's holdings adjoining their building project. I have had my representative, Mr. E. P. Bishop, handle this matter for me. He reports that it is a question whether a Park Commission now exists, that the terms of office of the men serving have expired and for some reason, no new members have been appointed, therefore I am presenting the matter to you.

Enclosed you will find a blueprint of the preliminary plan showing the park area in relation to the Government's Housing Project. This contains approximately eighteen (18) acres of land, practically all of which is not adapted for building owing to the fact that it lies too low to connect into the existing sewer. Naturally the U. S. Housing Corporation are anxious to have this area set aside for park purposes and would like to negotiate with you. They are willing to turn it over to the city at two-thirds of what it cost them, this would be in the neighborhood of Four Thousand Dollars.

The U. S. Housing Corporation will not be in a position to make this sale to the City after peace is declared without special authorization by Congress. I trust therefore immediate steps can be taken which will secure this park area and provide a neighborhood park for this section of the city.

We, the undersigned, being the owners of the number of feet of property opposite our names below and being three-fourths or more in interest of the owners of property abutting upon Waugh Street between the east line of Liberty Avenue and the east line of Morgan Avenue in said City of Alliance, Ohio, respectfully petition your Honorable Body for an improvement of said street between the points aforesaid by grading, curbing, flagging and paving and by constructing sanitary and storm water sewers with \_\_\_\_\_ and that the entire cost of said improvement, excepting only such portion thereof as is by law chargeable against the municipality, be assessed in proportion to the benefits upon the lots and lands bounding and abutting upon said Waugh Street between the points aforesaid.

Estimates submitted. City streets in bad shape.

Engineer Homer Anderson submitted to Council estimates on several proposed street improvements.

Mr. Grubb stated that the Street Committee in company with Mr. J. B. Wilcox had made an inspection trip over the paved streets of the city and found that some paving that had been down for less than four years was in awful shape. The Committee had decided that the best results had been obtained where slag base and sand filler had been used.

General Manager Harold Bonner of the Alliance Gas & Power Co. addressed Council, stating that he had expected to discuss at the present session a proposed plan for street lighting, but he hoped to have the desired information in a few days.

President Barnard suggested that a special committee had been named some time ago to investigate in regard to the gas supply of the city, and he thought it was time that something was being done to protect the people when the East Ohio Gas Co. shut off the supply of gas this coming fall.



This was referred to the engineer.

Widening of Arch Ave. referred to Director of Pub. Ser.

The need of widening Arch Avenue at the street car switch, so that vehicles could pass street cars standing at the siding was referred to the Director of Public Service.

Changing of watchmans shanty at Bdwy. crossing.

The matter of changing the location of the watchman's shanty at the Broadway crossing of the C. & P. Railroad tracks, so that a better view could be obtained, was referred to the railroad committee and the Solicitor.

Question of taking over Lake Park.

President Barnard stated that President W. H. Purcell of the Stark Electric R. R. Co. had asked if the City of Alliance desired to arrange for the taking over of Lake Park. Mayor Westover stated that he had asked two of the Park Commissioners to resign but had not as yet seen the third one. A new Commission will likely be named at an early date.
