

MONDAY MAY 12th, 1919.

Council met in adjourned session. Roll being called the following members answered to their names: Messrs. Grubb, Lower, Merts, Harry Miller, James Miller, Penick and Weaver. Present 7, absent 0.

In the absence of President Barnard, City Auditor C. O. Silver, called Council to order. Thereupon Mr. Lower was selected President Pro-Tem for the evening.

Need of Police Surgeon discussed.

Mayor Westover addressed Council regarding instances of a few nights ago when a four year old boy died at police headquarters without medical aid. The police stated they were unable to secure the services of a physician. The Mayor urged Council to take some action to prevent a re-occurrence of such a thing. City Solicitor Shetler said that as far as he was able to learn there was no law to compel a physician to answer a call if he did not so desire. The Solicitor suggested that Council should employ a police surgeon or if possible, extend the duties of the Health Officer to cover emergency calls.

Uncompleted Water Wks. contracts.

City Solicitor Shetler called attention to several contracts relating to the improvement at the Water Works, which had not been completed within the stipulated time; that they were settled and a resolution was pending in Council providing for their settlement.

Request the use of Council Chamber.

Charles Archer, representing a committee of citizens, requested the use of the Council Chamber for a public meeting to be held May 22d, which he said was of much public interest.

Bond Attorneys decline to approve bonds.

City Auditor Silver submitted to Council communications from the bond attorneys of A. E. Aub & Co declining to approve the \$14,500.00--5% Bonds of the City of Alliance, for the purpose of extending the time of payment of certain indebtedness. Also the \$5,900. 5% Bonds issued for the same purpose.
