Dr. G. B. Haggart has called our attention to the fact that there appeared recently a legal advertisement ordered by the city that it is proposed to pave the first alley south of and parallel to Main Street between Union Ave. and Mechanic Aven. and to lay such pavement to a new grade which cuts the grade of the alley in the rear of Dr. Haggart's property some three of four feet and will render access to his buildings and property from the rear impossible.

The grade of this alley has remained at its present level for many, many years and has been used in this way by the public and the property owners generally, and if we are not mistaken Mr. W. K. Fogg at one time while he owned this property, protested either direct to council or by suit, against such a proposed change of grade. Inasmuch as this proposed improvement will injure Dr. Haggart's property to a considerable extent, we have advised him and we are not notifying your honorable body of such damage in advance of any work being done in this connection and advise you, that it may be necessary to call upon the city to respond in damages in case this plan is carried out.
