

MONDAY JUNE 2d, 1919.

As heretofore stated to your honorable body by letter of recent date, the contemplated improvement of the first alley south of and parallel to Main Street, between Mechanic Avenue and Union Avenue, cuts down and changes the grade in said alley to the rear of my premises, which are known as Lot # 674 and 10 1/2 feet off the west side of Lot # 673 in the City of Alliance, Ohio, in such manner as to damage said property to the extent of \$2,000.00 which claim I hereby make and hereby file with the City as required by law.

There has been placed in our hands for presentation and settlement the claim of the Canton Feed & Milling Co. of Canton, Ohio, against the City of Alliance, on account of damages done at the Warner Mills by reason of the overflowing of a sewer near the Warner Mills on Prospect Street or just north of Prospect Street on or about the 29th day of May, 1918.

The sewer in question caused the flooding of the mills and the damaging of a large amount of flour and feed, the damage amounting to \$783.04, for which amount we present this claim and ask your Honorable Body to have it allowed and paid.
