Pomerine.

Communication was received from U. S. Senator Pomerine in which he stated that he recommended an appropriation of \$15,000.00 to be used by the U. S. Geographical Department, making a survey of the gas supply of Pennsylvania, Ohio and West Virginia, but the committee had voted it down. He stated that he did not see any relief in sight until next session of Congress. The City solicitor stated that his department had asked for an order from the Common Pleas Court to restrain the East Ohio gas Company and the Alliance Gas & Power Company from shutting off the gas on November 1st, and he had secured a temporary order for same, also that the Public Utilities Commission at Columbus had ordered the service continued until July 1, 1920.

We therefore request you to investigate the same, and take whatever measures are necessary to remedy the present condition.


