We, the undersigned residents of the district of Alliance, Ohio, adjacent to and surrounding the works of the Supreme Dairy Company, have been greatly annoyed by smoke and soot from the smokestack of the said Supreme Dairy Company's plant, which smoke and soot defaces and damages the property of this section. The absence of proper means of taking care of the smoke and soot from the aforementioned smokestack of the Supreme Dairy Company's plant, which plant is located in the residence part of the city, makes it impossible for the nearby residents of the city to leave windows open for proper ventilation in summer, or to enjoy their porches during the hot weather.

We the undersigned, do hereby petition your honorable Body to take steps at your convenience to provide a means of abating this nuisance.
