

MONDAY EVENING MAY 24th, 1920.

Council met in adjourned session with President Barnard in the chair.

The roll being called, the following members answered to their names, Messrs: Cary, Hall, Lower, H. T. Miller, Ryan and Weaver. Present 6, absent 1.

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A communication signed by H. K. Shafer of Alliance regarding the protecting of fish in the Westville Reservoir. Mr. Shafer stated in his letter that he believed that five (5) well equipped men in thirty (30) days of spring fishing would deplete the Westville Reservoir of bass fishing. He pointed out that it was very necessary to protect the fishing rights at the Reservoir. The communication was referred to the Council as a whole.

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The following petition was presented to Council and referred to the committee on streets and alleys.

PETITION TO VACATE STREET

To the Council of the City of Alliance, Ohio.

Gentlemen:

The undersigned, owners of the following lots Nos. 2920, 2922, 2926, 2927, 2928 and the westerly forty feet of 2929 in the city of Alliance, in the immediate vicinity of Willow Street from the first alley south of Summit Street to the south side of Grant Street, and the westerly ten feet of Willow Street from Summit Street to the first alley south of Summit Street, respectfully petition your honorable body that Willow Street may be vacated between points above named, for the reason that it is no longer of use to the public and its vacation will not be detrimental to the general and public interests.

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The City Solicitor presented to Council the following communication received from the State Department of Health.

Alliance- Water Supply. May 20th, 1920

Mr. Curtis M. Shetler,

Dear Sir:

Your letter of May 18th regarding the disposal of wastes from The Morgan Engineering Company at Alliance, has been received.

This matter has previously been brought to the attention of this department and as a result of a conference with the city officials, it has been our understanding that the city would extend its water supply intake to a point above the mouth of Trail Run. If this is not done, and the public water supply of the city suffers contamination due to Trail Run, the director of public service of the city of Alliance has power, in accordance with Section 12784 G.C., to require correction. In accordance with Section 1249 et seq G.C., the State Department of Health is also given power to require improvements to prevent the contamination of a public water supply.

This department is of opinion that the city of Alliance should extend its water supply intake to a suitable point, not only above Trail Run, but also above the creek which conveys the sewage of the village of Sebring. Until such extension is made, there will always be difficulty in controlling sources of pollution above the present intake.

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INTRODUCTION OF ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS

The following ordinances and resolutions were introduced:

Ordinance No. 76-C

Mr. H. T. Miller:

An ordinance to establish a grade on Cambridge Street from Rockhill Ave. to Parkway Blvd. was read the first time and referred to the grade committee.

Ordinance No. 68-C

Mr. Weaver:

To authorize an expenditure out of the Contingent Account of the General Fund was read the first time and referred to the Finance Committee.

Ordinance No. 74-C

Mr. Ryan:

An ordinance providing for the construction and repairs of certain sidewalks in the city of Alliance, Ohio, was read the first time and referred to the Sidewalk committee.

Resolution No. 73-C

Mr. Ryan:

Declaring it necessary to improve Parkway Blvd. between Cambridge Street and Grant Street by grading, draining, curbing, and paving with bituminous macadam, reinforced concrete or brick block on slag or concrete base, was read the first time and referred to the committee on streets and alleys.

Resolution No. 77-C

Mr. Ryan:

Declaring it necessary to improve W. Cambridge Street between Rockhill Ave. and Parkway Blvd. by grading, draining, curbing, and paving with bituminous macadam, concrete or brick block on slag or concrete base, was read the first time and referred to the committee on streets and alleys.

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The following ordinances and resolutions were taken up and considered:

Ordinance No. 64-C

Mr. Weaver:

An ordinance approving the action of the Board of Health in leasing office rooms from D. J. Miller for the Public Health Service Clinic was read the third time. The question being on the passage of the ordinance, the yeas and nays were taken and resulted yeas five, nays one. Those who voted in the affirmative were Messrs. Hall, Lower, H. T. Miller, Ryan, and Weaver. Mr. Cary voted in the negative. So the ordinance was passed.

Resolution No. 63-C

Mr. Weaver:

An ordinance fixing the salary of the Secretary of the Hospital Commission was read the third time. The question being on the passage of the Resolution the yeas and nays were taken and resulted yeas 4, nays 2. Those who voted in the affirmative were Messrs. Hall, H. T. Miller, Ryan, and Weaver. Messrs. Cary and Lower voted in the negative. So the Resolution was passed.

The question being on the suspension of the rules, the yeas and nays were taken and resulted yeas 6, nays 0. Those who voted in the affirmative were Messrs. Cary, Hall, Lower, H. T. Miller, Ryan, and Weaver. So the rules were suspended and the ordinance read the third time. Miller, Ryan, and Weaver. So the rules were suspended and the ordinance read the second and third time. The above matter was referred to the Council as a whole.

President Barnard appointed Messrs. Weaver, Hall and H. T. Miller as a committee to confer with the Civil War Veterans regarding the securing of the Encampment for 1921 for Alliance.

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On motion of Hall seconded by Weaver, Council adjourned.
