Now comes The Stark Electric Railway Company and hereby in writing accepts all of the terms, conditions and stipulations of a certain ordinance, passed by the Council of the City of Alliance, Ohio, August 16, 1920, and duly published August 21 and August 28, as required by law, granting to The Stark Electric Railway Company, a corporation, its successors and assigns, the right to charge certain cash fares and by the sale of tickets on its city lines and interurban lines within the limits of the City of Alliance, Stark County, Ohio, describing the terms and conditions thereof, to-wit:

Single cash fares, \$.07 (seven cents)  
Sixteen tickets, \$1.00 (one dollar)

We, the undersigned citizens of the City of Alliance, do hereby respectfully petition and urge your Honorable Body to pass and adopt an Ordinance now pending before your Honorable Body, entitled "AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE THE LOCATION, ERECTION AND MAINTENANCE OF PUBLIC GASOLINE OR OIL FILLING STATIONS, OR PUBLIC AUTOMOBILE GARAGES IN THE CITY OF ALLIANCE, OHIO", for the purpose of protecting our property against damage and loss because of a threatened construction and operation of an automobile garage near the corner of South Union Avenue and Rosenberry Street in the City of Alliance, and for the purpose of protecting the residence property of other persons thruout the City against a similar invasion.
