At a meeting of the Board of Directors of The College Hill Land Company held in their offices, 3rd floor of the Alliance Bank Building, Alliance, Ohio, on above date, Mr. Walter M. Gentlemen:

Our attention has been called to the fact that there is a strip of ground approximately eighteen (18) inches in width at one end

and about four (4) feet in width at the other end, one hundred and thirty-five (135) feet long, lying between the east boundary line of Parkway Boulevard and the lands owned by Mr. Ed. Lamborn, which is practically valueless and therefore would not be able to stand its share of the per foot frontage assessment which will be made to take care of the proposed improvement on Parkway Boulevard. This being the case, and desiring that the City of Alliance should not be asked to contribute to the payment in any way for the above described frontage, on behalf of The College Hill Land Company, an Ohio corporation, duly organized and existing under the laws of the State of Ohio and as President with authority from its Board of Directors, we hereby agree to take care of the assessments that may be made for the proposed improvement of the above described frontage on Parkway Boulevard at such times and in like manner as the assessments may be made regularly for this improvement.

If said request is granted, we hereby agree to pay into the City Treasury an amount sufficient to pay one-half the cost of said sewer except that part constructed on the streets and alleys of said City before the contract for the construction of the storm sewer is awarded.
