Note:- This estimate provides for no abutting property damage pending on the signing of satisfactory releases.

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Discussion as to purchase of addition ground for city hospital.

Mr. R. C. Hopkins, President of the Hospital Commission addressed Council urging the purchase of two buildings and one vacant lot adjacent to the present hospital and which he stated that he already had a thirty day option on same. The question arose which was followed by discussion, as to the legality of the purchase of this property at the present time out of the funds already appropriated for an addition to the present city hospital. On motion of Weaver seconded by Hall, Mr. Hopkins was requested to secure an extension of the option which he had secured on this property.

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Mayor Westover calls attention to gas situation.

Mayor Westover being present called attention to the gas situation that our present contract expired November 1st, 1921. Upon motion of Ryan the Mayor and City Solicitor were added to the Special Gas committee which had been previously appointed to investigate this matter.

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Mr. , Mgr. of the Alliance Gas & Power Company being present stated that he now was in correspondence with the New York office regarding the extension of the gas contract.

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Mr. Rockhill states that sewer on Rockhill Ave. is of no benefit to him.

Mr. Westley Rockhill addressed Council upon the proposed improvement of the sanitary sewer on Rockhill Avenue and stated that it was of no benefit to him whatever.
