Next attached you will find instructions that have been placed with our Enginemen and our Road Foreman of Engines.

As I promised you yesterday, we will make an honest endeavor to eliminate black smoke, and I wish to assure you that the firing of engines will be carefully supervised and only such firing will be done inside the City limits as is absolutely necessary to handle the trains and keep up the necessary steam pressure.

Referring to attached notice:

I wish you would talk to the various enginemen, especially those regularly assigned to pass through Alliance, and say to them that these instructions must be fully complied with, that the City is now contemplating the passing of an ordinance in connection with the smoke nuisance, and I would be glad to show the City of Alliance that we can co-operate with them without having a penalty hung over our heads.

Careless firing which causes large volumes of black smoke is unnecessary, and men who persist in this kind of work will be disciplined.

Judge Moore asks permission for Eagle Home Co. to construct sanitary sewer on Main St. which was granted.

Judge Moore appeared before Council on behalf of the Eagles Home Company and stated that there was no sanitary sewer on Main Street that can be connected to the basement of the new block which they are building. The Eagle Home Company will construct an eight inch (8") or larger sewer on Main Street to the rear of the Parthe Block and asked permission to do so. On motion of J. H.
