Referring to the paving of West State Street, beg to say that the assessment is too high for same on the following described property: situated in Lexington Township, Stark County, State of Ohio, and known as being a part of the east half of the southwest quarter of section number thirty-five (35), Township nineteen (19) range six (6), and bounded and described as follows: beginning at a point on the south line of said section, four hundred and eighty-four and one half (484½) feet west from a stone at the intersection of what is known as State Street and the Rockhill Road; thence north parallel with said Rockhill Road one hundred and sixty-five (165) feet; thence west one hundred and thirty-two (132) feet; thence south one hundred and sixty-five (165) feet to the south line of said section; thence east one hundred and thirty-two (132) feet along said south line of said section, to the place of beginning, containing one half of an acre of land.
