He stated that he could arrange to come to Alliance after the first of April, make a preliminary survey, advise on smoke ordinance, go over the local problems, give instructions as to the engineering features involved, for \$500.00, the work to be done the first ten days in April. Introduction of Ord. 23-F

An ordinance authorizing and directing the Director of Public Service to enter into a contract for the purchase of coal for the Water Works department was read the first time and referred to the Finance Committee for immediate action.

Ordinance No. 35-F

An ordinance to provide for the regulation of public dances and the licensing and regulation of public dance halls and penalties for violation thereof was read the first time and referred to the Judiciary Committee.

Ordinance No. 19-F

An ordinance providing for the issuing of bonds of the City of Alliance in the sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for the purpose of purchasing and condemning the necessary land for one or more parks or public playgrounds south of Main Street, Alliance and one or more parks or public playgrounds north of Main Street and for improving, equipping and furnishing the said lands and any other land now owned by the City of Alliance, for park or playground purposes in an amount greater than one per cent, was read the first time and referred to the Finance Committee.

An ordinance requiring the Stark Electric Railroad Company to renew, replace, repair, and reconstruct the rails, ties, roadbed, and tracks on East Main St. between Mechanic Avenue and Union Avenue in accordance with the plans and specifications prepared by the City Engineer of the City of Alliance, was read the first time and referred to the committee on streets and alleys.

An ordinance declaring it necessary to widen East Main Street between Mechanic Avenue and Union Avenue in the City of Alliance, Ohio, was read the first time and referred to the committee on streets and alleys.

Resolution No. 24-F

Introduction of Res. 24-F

An ordinance declaring it necessary to improve South Arch Avenue from East Main Street to Milner Street to the width of thirty-eight (38) feet was read the first time and referred to the committee on streets and alleys.

Ordinance No. 25-F

An ordinance declaring it necessary to widen the paved portion of South Arch Avenue between Main Street and Milner Street in the city of Alliance, Ohio, was read the first time and referred to the committee on streets and alleys.

Ordinance No. 22-F

Introduction of Ord. 22-F

An ordinance to vacate that part of Willow Avenue lying between a line 90 feet north of the original north line of Grant Street and parallel thereto and the north line of Grant Street and that part of Grant Street lying between the east line of Willow Avenue and the east line of the right of way of the Cleveland & Pittsburgh Railroad Company in the city of Alliance, Ohio, was read the first time and referred to the streets and alleys committee for immediate action.

Ryan moved seconded by Davis that when council adjourn it adjourn to meet next Monday Evening, which motion was agreed to.
