(b) \$50,000.00 for the purchase of land - thirty years.

The following communication was presented to Council and read.

Honorable Council of the City of Alliance,

Gentlemen:

As requested by Section 3842-4, General Code of the State of Ohio, I hereby recommend to your Honorable Body that a Boulevard or White Way Lighting System be installed along the following streets:

East Main Street, from Union Avenue to the right of way of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company;
Arch Avenue, from Market Street to Prospect Street;
Linden Avenue, from Market Street to Prospect Street;
Seneca Avenue, from Market Street to Warehouse Street;
Liberty Avenue, from Market Street to Main Street;
The north side of Warehouse Street, from Seneca Avenue to Freedom Avenue.

Freedom Avenue, Market Street to Prospect Street.

This recommendation is based on the necessity of a more efficient lighting system along the streets above mentioned, and not only will it add to the beauty of the city, but will also provide for an up-to-date method of street lighting, and put Alliance on the same place with other progressive cities.
