TO THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ALLIANCE, OHIO.

The City of Alliance contemplates issuing \$70,875.00 City Portion Improvement Bonds, including the sum of \$3,375.00 for interest not exceeding one year.

As required by Section 2295-7 and 10 of the General Code, I, the undersigned City Auditor of the City of Alliance, do hereby certify as follows:

1. That the estimated life of the property asset or improvements referred to above is as follows:

widening of the

(a) For the city's portion of constructing streets and sanitary sewers, twenty-five (25) years.

(b) For the city's portion of lighting Main Street by installing a white way, fifteen (15) years.

Weighted average years of usefulness, twenty-four (24) years.

2. That the maximum maturity of such bonds calculated in accordance with the provisions of Section 2295-9 of the General Code, is as follows:

widening of the

(a) \$63,900.00 for the city's portion of constructing streets and sanitary sewers, twenty-five (25) years.

(b) \$ 3,600.00 for the city's portion of lighting Main Street by installing a white way, fifteen (15) years.

The weighted average of maturities based on the amounts to be expended for said several classes is twenty-five (25) years. Should you authorize a single bond issue for all of said classes the maximum maturity of said bonds could not exceed the weighted average of twenty-four (24) years.
