

Ordinance No. 19-E.

An ordinance to license billiard rooms, pool rooms and bowling alleys within the City of Alliance, Ohio and to repeal all conflicting ordinances.

Be It Ordained By The Council Of The City Of Alliance, State of Ohio:

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, firm, partnership or corporation to operate or conduct a billiard room, pool room or bowling alley within the City of Alliance, Ohio for money or other reward without having first obtained a license therefore from the Mayor, provided however, that no license shall be granted to any person who is not a citizen of the United States. The license fee for a billiard room and pool room shall be as follows: \$15.00 for one table and \$10.00 for each additional table for the year or any part thereof, ending on the 1st day of January of each year.

The license fee for a bowling alley shall be \$25.00 for one alley and \$15.00 for each additional alley for the year or any part thereof, ending on the 1st day of January of each year.

Section 2. That the Mayor of the City of Alliance, Ohio, shall have the right and authority to revoke any license issued by virtue of this ordinance at any time that said licensee has been convicted of a crime or misdemeanor under the laws of the State of Ohio or the ordinances of the City of Alliance.

Section 3. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.

Section 4. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

Parking of vehicles shall be prohibited on the north side of West State Street from Union Avenue to a point 75 feet west of Union Avenue; the west side of North Linden Avenue between Main St. and first alley north of Main Street.

Ordinance Number 34-E

Mr. M. Ryan:

An ordinance to provide certain rules and regulations relating to the operation of busses within the City of Alliance, Ohio, having a seating capacity of more than seven (7) persons including the operator.

Be It Ordained By The Council Of The City Of Alliance, State of Ohio:

Section One: That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons having in charge or operation a bus or automobile vehicle designed for the carrying of passengers, which bus has a seating capacity of more than seven (7) persons, including the operator, to cross the tracks of a steam railroad at grade within the corporate limits of the City of Alliance, Ohio, without first causing said bus or automobile to come to a full stop not nearer than ten (10) feet nor farther than fifty (50) feet from the crossing and before crossing said steam railroad tracks ascertain that the way is clear for the passage thereof and free from danger. Such bus shall not proceed to cross until the driver or some person in charge thereof has ascertained that the way is clear for the passage of said bus over the tracks.

Section Two. Any person or persons found guilty of the violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be fined not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$300.00 for a first offense and for a second offense shall be fined not less than \$100.00 nor more than \$500.00 and the costs of prosecution.

Section Three. That the Company operating such busses as well as the operator thereof shall be liable in damages to any person or persons injured in person or property by reason of a violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance.

Section Four. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

Mr. Davis:

An Ordinance regulating the operation of motor busses, providing for certain annual payments, and providing for the licensing thereof.

Be it Ordained By The Council Of The City Of Alliance

Section 1. Definitions.

A motor bus is hereby defined to be an automobile, auto-truck or trackless motor vehicle engaged in the business of carrying passengers for hire within the city limits of Alliance and from points within the City of Alliance to surrounding cities or villages, which is held out or announced by sign, voice, writing, device or advertisement, to operate or run, or which does operate or run, or which is intended to be operated or run over any particular street or route, or to any particular or designated point or between particular points, or to or within any designated territory district or zone.

Provided, however, that nothing herein shall be held to apply to taxi-cabs, automobiles for hire, hotel busses, sight-seeing cars, hearses, ambulances, pall-bearers' vehicles and railway and street cars, trucks or automobiles operated by individuals, partnerships or corporations, for the carriage of their own employees, and any automobile, auto truck, or trackless motor vehicle, carrying not to exceed seven passengers.

Section 2. License Required.

It shall be unlawful for any person, partnership or corporation, either as principal, agent or employee, to use or occupy any street, alley or other public place, within the corporate limits of the City of Alliance, with any motor bus as above defined, for the carriage of persons for hire and to operate the same by indiscriminately accepting as passengers such persons as may offer themselves for transportation along the way or course on which it is used or operated, or may be running, without first obtaining a license from the City of Alliance.

Section 3. Application for License.

Application for a license by any person, partnership or corporation, under the provisions of this ordinance, shall be made in writing to the Mayor, which application shall contain a map of its proposed route, showing the streets, alleys and public places upon which it desires to operate, together with operating schedule of headway to be maintained and the number of cars and vehicles to be operated.

These applications shall be filed with the Mayor and he shall immediately refer the same to the Director of Public Safety, who shall investigate the same and report his approval or disapproval of the same to the Mayor. Upon approval of the application by the Director of Public Safety, the Mayor shall issue such license upon the

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payment of the fee therefor hereinafter provided. In considering said application the Director of Public Safety may exclude bus services, as defined in this ordinance, from certain streets or parts of streets, for safety, sanitary or other reasons involving the public welfare. The applicant shall have the privilege, if he so desires, of amending, modifying or altering his application so as to comply with the reasonable suggestions or requirements of the Director of Public Safety, who shall have the power to approve the same in such amended, modified or altered form.

It shall be unlawful for any person, partnership or corporation licensed under the provisions of this ordinance, to operate any bus or buses in the City of Alliance on any route other than the route provided for in said license. It shall be unlawful for any such licensee to fail or refuse to operate such bus or buses over the whole of said route in the manner and in the places therein specified, or to neglect or refuse to comply with any and all regulations with respect to routes as the same may be reasonably established from time to time by the Director of Public Safety, under the authority of this ordinance.

Section 4. Annual Payments And Issuance of License.

Every person, partnership or corporation engaging in the occupation in this ordinance set forth, shall pay to the Mayor the sum of \$25.00 per annum in advance for each motor bus having a seating capacity to carry, not to exceed 14 passengers; the sum of \$50.00 per annum in advance for each motor bus having a seating capacity to carry, from 15 to 21 passengers; the sum of \$75.00 per annum in advance for each motor bus having seating capacity to carry from 22 to 30 passengers; the sum of \$100.00 per annum in advance for each motor bus having seating capacity to carry to exceed 30 passengers; before it shall be lawful for any person, partnership or corporation, to operate any such motor bus as a carrier of passengers in the business herein defined, within the limits of the City of Alliance, Ohio. Upon the payment of such annual charges against the said occupation, by persons engaging therein, and upon compliance with the remaining terms of this ordinance, a license shall be issued as in this ordinance provided, for the period of one year from date thereof, without further charge, except as provided in Section 6 hereof.

Section 5. Indemnity Bond Or Liability Insurance Optional.

Every person, partnership or corporation shall, except as hereinafter provided, furnish and file with the Mayor a good and sufficient

indemnity bond to the approval of the Mayor, in the sum of not less than \$5000.00 for the operation of each motor bus having a seating capacity to carry, not to exceed 14 passengers; in the sum of not less than \$75000.00 for each motor bus having a seating capacity to carry, from 15 to 21 passengers; and in the sum of not less than \$10,000.00 for each motor bus having a seating capacity to carry, to exceed 22 passengers; before it shall be lawful to operate any such motor busses, and the said indemnity bond shall be kept and maintained as hereinafter provided, at the respective amounts set forth herein, during the whole time of operation of said motor busses and until every claim against said person, partnership or corporation, for injuries or damage or death, incurred or suffered by person or property, by negligence or wrongful act, in the operation of said motor bus, is completely satisfied. Such bond shall be conditioned to the effect that in the event of any person or property being injured or damaged by negligence in the operation of any motor bus owned or operated by persons, partnership or corporation so injured in person or property shall have a right of action thereon and that the bonds shall remain in full force until such claim is satisfied; and such bonds shall not be void upon first recovery, but he may be sued upon and recovered upon from time to time until the full penalty thereof is exhausted. In case of recovery against or payment of damages by the surety of any such bond, the principal shall at once give additional bond in the amount paid or recovered, to the end that there shall be at all times the principal sum hereinbefore specified available for the compensation of death by wrongful act, injuries and damages.

Provided, however, that in lieu of the giving of said bond, every person, partnership or corporation may, at their option, furnish and file with the Mayor a copy of a liability insurance policy in the same amounts respectively, as hereinbefore set forth, for the operation of each motor bus, such policy to be written by an insurance or liability company authorized to carry on business and to write such policies in Ohio; such liability insurance to be acceptable to and approved by the City Attorney before it shall be lawful to operate any such motor busses, and the said liability shall be kept and maintained as hereinafter provided at the amounts herein defined during the whole time of operation of the said motor busses and until every claim against said person, partnership or corporation for injuries or

damages or death by wrongful act incurred or suffered by any person or property, other than an employee of the assured, by negligence in the operation of any such motor bus, now in force or which may hereafter be put in force until all claims are completely satisfied. Said liability insurance will contain a provision and condition therein that the insurance and liability company or its local representative shall notify and inform the City of Alliance, Ohio, at least five days before any cancellation of the policy and until such notice is given said provision of the policy shall provide that said liability insurance company is to be and remain fully liable under the terms of the liability insurance. Copy of said policy is to be filed with and kept by the mayor.

Such liability policy shall contain a further provision that:

A. The insolvency or bankruptcy of the person, partnership or corporation so insured shall not release the insurance company from the payment of damages for injuries sustained, or death by wrongful act, or loss incurred; and in case execution against such insured person, partnership, or corporation is returned unsatisfied, in action brought by the insured person or his personal representative, or any person sustaining damages, because of such insolvency or bankruptcy, then an action may be maintained by the injured person or his personal representative or by any persons entitled to sue for death by wrongful act, against the insurance company direct, under the terms of the policy, for the amount of the judgment in said action, not exceeding the amount of the policy.

B. And the policy may be sued upon at any time provided for by the laws of the State of Ohio.

Section 6. Eligibility of Operators of Busses.

It shall be unlawful for any person, partnership or corporation to allow or permit or cause any motor bus, as herein defined, used in the business specified in this ordinance, to be operated by any person other than a citizen of the United States, over 21 years of age, skilled in the art of driving automobiles and without physical disabilities or personal habits which would disqualify him or make him an unsuitable person from serving as a driver of a public vehicle, and having a sufficient knowledge of the English language to carry on an intelligent conversation.

Names of such operators shall be registered with the Director of Public Safety, and upon approval by him, individual licenses

shall be issued to such operator for the calendar year by the mayor upon the payment of a license fee of \$5.00 each.

Section 7. Revocation of License.

The mayor may revoke the license of any person to operate any such motor bus, whenever the person so licensed or the person, partnerships or corporation to whom the license or permit had been granted has been convicted for the violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance or infraction of the traffic regulations of said city, or whenever by reason of incompetency, negligence, gross misconduct, or conviction of a felony, the mayor is of the opinion that in the interest of the public the same should be revoked.

Whenever a license or permit has been revoked, no new license or permit shall be issued to the same person until ^{after} the expiration of at least one year.

Section 8. Subject to General Ordinance, etc.

(a) Every person, partnerships or corporation obtaining a license to engage in the motor bus business as defined in this ordinance, and every person, obtaining a license to operate any such motor bus shall be subject to all of the terms and conditions of this ordinance and to all of the general ordinances of the City of Alliance which are to be enacted, in any manner applicable thereto.

(b) All busses within the terms of this ordinance shall be stopped on signal for the taking on or discharging of passengers only on the opposite or far side of the approaching intersecting street, and not on the near side thereof.

Section 9. Tags To Be Displayed, Etc.

Each motor bus operated under the provisions of this ordinance shall carry constantly displayed upon the same in a conspicuous position the license plate or number as issued by the mayor. Each driver of such motor bus shall carry such license on his person while engaged in such operation.

Section 10. Appeal.

Any person, partnership or corporation applying for a license to engage in a motor bus business, or any person applying for a license as an operator of a motor bus, under the provisions of this ordinance, shall have a right of appeal from the act of the mayor in refusing to issue a license in the first instance, or from his order or decision in revoking any license which has been previously issued.

If the mayor refuses to issue any such

license, or if he shall revoke the same after it has been previously issued, he shall notify the applicant in writing by mail or otherwise within ten days after his act of refusing the license, or of revoking the same as the case may be, and the aggrieved party shall have the right to appeal to a board composed of the Director of Public Safety, the Director of Public Service, the City Attorney, the City Auditor and President of Council, which said board, after full hearing, shall have the power to sustain or modify the decision of the Mayor and to order the license granted, and shall have the power to modify, sustain or reverse the decision of the Mayor in revoking the license. In either case the decision of the Board shall be final.

The party appealing from the decision of the Mayor shall leave notice in writing of his intention to appeal at the office of the Mayor within ten days after the receipt of said notice from the Mayor.

Section 11. Inspection of Busses.

Busses shall be constructed, and at all times maintained in a safe manner capable of safely carrying the number of passengers that are to be carried, and the means of ingress and egress thereto by doors, steps and otherwise, shall be of such a character so as to permit of easy ingress and egress and shall always be kept in a safe condition, and busses shall be kept in a clean and sanitary condition at all times, all to the satisfaction of the Director of Public Safety.

It shall be the duty of the police officers of the City of Alliance to examine all motor busses and inspect the same from time to time, without notice to any person, partnership or corporation licensed under the provisions of this ordinance, for the purpose of ascertaining whether they are in a safe and sanitary condition.

Section 12. Penalty.

Any person, partnership or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof be fined not less than \$100.00 nor more than \$500.00 and every such violation of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 13. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.

Section 14. When to Take Effect.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

Ordinance No. 94-E.

Mr. Davis:

An ordinance providing rules and regulations governing the installation of electrical wiring for light, heat and power, in all buildings within the City of Alliance, Ohio.

Be It Ordained By The Council Of The City Of Alliance, State of Ohio:

Section One: That all electrical wiring for light, heat and power shall be of such construction and so installed and maintained as to reduce the life and fire hazard as far as possible.

All wiring for light, heat or power shall meet the requirements of the National Electric Code.

All fittings and devices used shall be approved by the Underwriters Laboratory or Bureau of Standards.

All electrical equipment shall comply with this ordinance when placed in service, and shall thereafter be maintained in a safe condition. Defective wiring or equipment shall at the discretion of the City Electrical Inspector or Chief of Fire Department, be put in good order or permanently disconnected.

Repairs, extensions and changes made to existing equipment shall be done by properly qualified persons only. All such work shall be inspected by the City Electrical Inspector before being put into service.

All wiring for light, heat or power in what is known as the Fire District, described in the City Building Code, shall be entirely in approved metallic conduit, or metal moulding, or approved armored cable, installed according to the National Electric Code.

All wiring for light, heat or power in public buildings such as schools, hospitals, churches, hotels, dance halls and dwelling houses intended for more than two (2) families, factories, warehouses, feed stores, livery stables, garages (where more than two (2) machines are kept) and in buildings of fireproof construction, shall be in approved metallic conduit, metal moulding, or approved armored cable, installed according to the National Electric Code.

All new wiring done in buildings of the above classes shall be installed as provided herein and the City Electrical Inspector or Chief of Fire Department may at their discretion require all wiring in the building to conform to this ordinance before allowing alterations or additions to be made.

In installations outside of the Fire District and in buildings not classed as above, concealed "knob and tube" work will be permitted when it complies with the National Electric Code.

Service Entrances

Section Two: That all service entrances must be

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run in approved metallic conduit of the size specified in the National Electric Code for the wires to be carried. This conduit must terminate in an approved inclosed "safety" switch, with handle to operate from the outside. This switch must be placed in the nearest readily accessible place to where the wires enter the building.

One service only for each class of service, namely, light, heat, power, flat rate, shall be run to each building, except "Emergency" lights for Theaters. This prohibits running separate services to each floor and provides one point to cut off all electric current in each building in case of fire.

All buildings wired for more than one meter must have a three wire service and an inclosed externally operated switch provided on this service as well as on each meter.

Grounds

Section Three: That each service conduit and switch box must be grounded. The neutral wire of the line must be grounded.

The system of conduit in the house must be grounded.

Each of the above must be grounded separately, except that the house system ground may be omitted, where the house system is properly bonded to the service conduit or switch box.

The ground conductor must be of copper and must be continuous from conduit or box to the street side of the water meter, except as provided below. The size of this conductor shall be at least #8 B. & S. gage.

This conductor must be supported in an approved manner and protected from mechanical injury.

If metallic conduit is used for protection, this conduit shall not be used as conductor for either ground. However, there must be another ground run from the end of this protecting conduit to the water pipe.

In case of no water in the building at least two ground rods shall be driven, - one for the neutral ground and one for the conduit ground. These ground rods shall not be connected together and must be kept at least five (5) feet apart.

In special cases due to the inaccessibility of the water meter, two ground rods may be driven; in very exceptional cases the grounds may be made at other points on the water line than at the meter. For these cases, special permission must be obtained before any work is done.

Fuses and Switches

Section Four: That all fuses must be

enclosed in approved metal boxes, approved panel or distribution boxes.

Switches must operate so that when the switch is in the "off" position the fuses will be "dead."

Replacement of fuses with pennies or other metallic substances is absolutely prohibited. However, in case of the neutral wire, the fuse may be omitted and a solid piece of copper wire permanently fastened in its place.

Meters, switches and fuses shall not be placed directly under water pipes or nearer in any direction than 18 inches.

All wiring in basements, rooms with cement, tile or earthen floors, when not in rigid iron conduit, must have all fixtures, switches and sockets of porcelain or other non-absorbent insulating material.

All drop lights, portable hand or trouble lamps, when used on cement, tile or earthen floors, or in and around boilers or other grounded bodies, shall be made up of wire equivalent to "Brewery Cord," and have a porcelain or composition socket. All portable hand or trouble lamps must, in addition to the above, have approved lamp guards.

All transformers and substation equipment installed indoors must be placed in a special fireproof vault well ventilated to the outside and shut off from the rest of the building by approved fire doors.

There must be a permanent sewer connection to this vault and the floor must drain to one point and sewer connection of at least four (4) inch pipe from there through a trap.

Inspections

Section Five: That the City Electrical Inspector, or his authorized deputy shall make a thorough inspection of each and every job before the service is rendered. He shall keep a permanent record in his office at the City Hall and shall furnish the lighting or power Company with a certificate of inspection and no service shall be rendered until this certificate is turned in.

Any building with service disconnected shall be re-inspected and no service shall be rendered until this certificate is turned in.

Any building with service disconnected shall be re-inspected before service is re-established.

The City Electrical Inspector, may, after due inspection, order service discontinued until such time as all wiring is put in safe condition.

The charge for inspection shall be as follows:

For all new work, "roughing in" - 10-15 outlets or less	\$1.00
15-25 " " "	1.50
Each outlet exceeding 25 outlets	.05
For final inspection - \$1.00 for first ten (10) sockets;	
.05 for each socket exceeding ten and up to twenty-five (25);	
.02 for each above twenty-five.

Motor installations	
Each motor .05 per H.P. with a minimum charge of \$1.00 per motor.	
Extension to old equipment:	
1-light	.35
1-4 lights, each	.25
4-10 lights	1.00
10- lights or over, each	.10

When the inspector is called for final inspection, and finds the job incomplete, or of faulty construction, he shall collect the fee for final inspection, and then each additional trip necessary, until the final certificate is issued, shall be subject to a charge of .50¢.

Section Six: That any person or persons, firm or corporation found guilty of the violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be fined not less than Twenty-five Dollars nor more than Three Hundred Dollars, or imprisoned in the Stark County Work House for not more than six months, or both.

Section Seven: That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

RESOLUTION NUMBER 12-E

Mr. Davis:

Declaring it necessary to improve West Harrison Street by constructing sanitary sewer number 189.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ALLIANCE, STATE OF OHIO, THREE-FOURTHS OF THE MEMBERS ELECTED THERETO CONCURRING:

Section 1. That it is necessary to improve West Harrison Street by constructing a sanitary sewer according to the plans and profiles now on file in the department of Public Service.

Section 2. That the plans, specifications, estimates and profiles of the proposed improvement heretofore prepared by the Engineer and now on file in the office of the Director of Public Service be and the same are hereby approved.

Section 3. That the whole cost of said improvement less 15 per cent thereof shall be assessed: By the foot front, upon the following described lots and lands, to-wit: All lots and lands bounding and abutting upon the proposed improvement which said lots and lands are hereby determined to be specially benefited by said improvement; and the cost of said improvement shall include the expense of preliminary and other surveys and all printing and publishing of notices, resolutions and ordinances required and the serving of said notices, the cost of construction, together with interest on bonds issued in anticipation of the collection of deferred assessments and all other necessary expenditures.

Section 4. That the assessments so to be levied shall be paid in 6 semi-annual installments with interest on deferred payments at 6 per cent per annum, provided that the owner of any property assessed may at his option, pay such assessments in cash within days from and after the passage of the assessing ordinance in which case said assessments shall not include any item of interest upon bonds to be issued in anticipation of the collection of deferred installments of assessments.

Section 5. That the bonds of the City of Alliance, Ohio, shall be issued in anticipation of collection of assessments by installments in an amount equal thereto.

Section 6. That the remainder of the entire cost of said improvement not specially assessed including the cost of intersections together with the cost of any real estate or interest therein purchased or appropriated and the cost and expenses of any appropriation proceedings therefore, and the damages awarded any owner of adjoining lands and interest thereon, and the cost and expenses of any such award, shall be paid out of Sanitary sewer 189 fund.

Section 7. This resolution is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and its enactment is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health, safety and welfare. The necessity therefore lies in the fact that unless immediate legislation is provided therefore, such improvement cannot be consummated before the winter months but will necessitate the delay of making and completing such improvement until the following summer much to the inconvenience and detriment of the public health, safety and welfare of the inhabitants of the City of Alliance, Ohio.

Section 8. This resolution shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

SECTION ONE - That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons having in charge or operation a buss or automobile vehicle designed for the carrying of passengers, which buss has a seating capacity of more than seven (7) persons, including the operator, to cross the tracks of a steam railroad at grade within the corporate limits of the City of Alliance, Ohio, without first causing said buss or automobile to come to a full stop not nearer than ten (10) feet nor farther than fifty (50) feet from the crossing and before crossing said steam railroad tracks ascertain that the way is clear for the passage thereof and free from danger. Such buss shall not proceed to cross until the driver or some person in charge thereof has ascertained that the way is clear for the passage of said buss over the tracks.

SECTION TWO - Any person or persons found guilty of the violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be fined not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$300.00 for a first offense and for a second offense shall be fined not less than \$100.00 nor more than \$500.00 and the cost of prosecution.

SECTION THREE - That the Company operating such busses as well as the operator thereof shall be liable in damages to any person or persons injured in person or property by reason of a violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance.

Section Two: In consideration of the Council of the City of Alliance, Ohio, granting to the said Frank McCort the exclusive right to place public trash receptacles on the streets and alleys the said Frank McCort shall pay to the City of Alliance, Ohio, the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50.) per annum for twenty (20) receptacles and for each additional receptacles the sum of Two Dollars and fifty Cents (\$2.50) each per annum, which money shall be paid in the Treasury to the credit of the Public Service Fund.

The Director of Public Service shall determine the size, style and material of all new receptacles constructed and placed on the streets and alleys and shall at all times determine the location of any and all receptacles.

Section Three: That whenever the said Frank McCort fails to comply with the terms and provisions of this ordinance, then this ordinance shall be null and void. That the said Frank McCort shall pay for the publication of this ordinance.

ORDINANCE NO. 73-E

Mr. Davis:

AN ORDINANCE regulating the operation of motor busses, providing for certain annual payments, and providing for the licensing thereof.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ALLIANCE:

SECTION 1. DEFINITIONS.

A motor bus is hereby defined to be an automobile, auto-truck or trackless motor vehicle engaged in the business of carrying passengers for hire within the city limits of Alliance and from points within the City of Alliance to surrounding cities or villages, which is held out or announced by sign, voice, writing, device or advertisement, to operate or run, or which does operate or run, or which is intended to be operated or run over any particular street or route, or to any particular or designated point or between particular points, or to or within any designated territory, district or zone.

Provided, however, that nothing herein shall be held to apply to taxicabs, automobiles for hire, hotel busses, sight-seeing cars, hearses, ambulances, pall-bearers' vehicles and railway and street cars, trucks or automobiles operated by individuals, partnerships or corporations, for the carriage of their own employees, and any automobile auto truck, or trackless motor vehicle, carrying not to exceed seven passengers.

SECTION 2. LICENSE REQUIRED.

It shall be unlawful for any person, partnership or corporation, either as principal, agent or employee, to use or occupy any street, alley or other public place, within the corporate limits of the City of Alliance with any motor bus as above defined, for the carriage of persons for hire and to operate the same by indiscriminately accepting as passengers such persons as may offer themselves for transportation along the way or course on which it is used or operated or may be running, without first obtaining a license from the City of Alliance.

SECTION 3. APPLICATION FOR LICENSE.

Application for a license by any person, partnership or corporation under the provisions of this ordinance, shall be made in writing to the Mayor, which application shall contain a map of the proposed route, showing the streets, alleys and public places upon which it desires to operate, together with operating schedule of headway to be maintained and the number of cars and vehicles to be operated.

These applications shall be filed with the Mayor and he shall immediately refer the same to the Director of Public Safety, who shall investigate the same and report his approval or disapproval of the same to the Mayor. Upon approval of the application by the Director of Public Safety, the Mayor shall issue such license upon the payment of the fee therefore hereinafter provided. In considering said applications the Director of Public Safety may exclude bus service as defined in this ordinance, from certain streets or parts of streets, for safety, sanitary or other reasons involving the public welfare. The applicant shall have the privilege, if he so desires, of amending, modifying or altering his application so as to comply with the reasonable suggestions or requirements of the Director of Public Safety, who shall have the power to approve the same in such amended, modified or altered form.

It shall be unlawful for any person, partnership or corporation licensed under the provisions of this ordinance, to operate any bus or busses in the City of Alliance on any route other than the route provided for in said license; and it shall be unlawful for any such licensee to fail or refuse to operate such bus or busses over the whole of said route in the manner and in the places therein specified, or to neglect or refuse to comply with any and all regulations with respect to routes as the same may be reasonably established from time to time by the Director of Public Safety, under the authority of this ordinance.

SECTION 4. ANNUAL PAYMENTS AND ISSUANCE OF LICENSE.

Every person, partnership or corporation engaging in the occupation in this ordinance set forth, shall pay to the Mayor the sum of \$25.00 per annum in advance for each motor bus having a seating capacity to carry, not to exceed 14 passengers; the sum of \$50.00 per annum in advance for each motor bus having a seating capacity to carry, from 15 to 21 passengers; the sum of \$75.00 per annum in advance for each motor bus having seating capacity to carry from 22 to 30 passengers; the sum of \$100.00 per annum in advance for each motor bus having seating capacity to carry to exceed 30 passengers; before it shall be lawful for any person, partnership or corporation, to operate any such motor bus as a carrier of passengers in the business herein defined, within the limits of the City of Alliance, Ohio. Upon the payment of such annual charges against the said occupation, by persons engaging therein, and upon compliance with the remaining terms of this ordinance, a license shall be issued as in this ordinance provided, for the period of one year from date thereof, without further charge, except as provided in Section 6 hereof.

SECTION 5. INDEMNITY BOND OR LIABILITY INSURANCE OPTIONAL.

Every person, partnership or corporation shall, except as hereinafter provided, furnish and file with the Mayor a good and sufficient

indemnity bond to the approval of the Mayor, in the sum of not less than \$5,000.00 for the operation of each motor bus having a seating capacity to carry, not to exceed 14 passengers; in the sum of not less than \$7,500.00 for each motor bus having a seating capacity to carry, from 15 to 21 passengers; and in the sum of not less than \$10,000.00 for each motor bus having a seating capacity to carry, to exceed 22 passengers; before it shall be lawful to operate any such motor busses, and the said indemnity bond shall be kept and maintained as hereinafter provided, at the respective amounts set forth herein, during the whole time of operation of said motor busses and until every claim against said person, partnership or corporation, for injuries or damage or death, incurred or suffered by person or property, by negligence or wrongful act, in the operation of said motor bus, is completely satisfied. Such bond shall be conditioned to the effect that in the event of any person or property being injured or damaged by negligence in the operation of any motor bus owned or operated by persons, partnership or corporation so injured in person or property shall have a right of action thereon and that the bonds shall remain in full force until such claim is satisfied; and such bonds shall not be void upon first recovery, but he may be sued upon and recovered upon from time to time until the full penalty thereof is exhausted. In case of recovery against or payment of damages by the surety of any such bond, the principal shall at once give additional bond in the amount paid or recovered, to the end that there shall be at all times the principal sum hereinbefore specified available for the compensation of death by wrongful act, injuries and damages.

Provided, however, that in lieu of the giving of said bond, every person, partnership or corporation may, at their option, furnish and file with the Mayor a copy of a liability insurance policy in the same amounts respectively, as hereinbefore set forth, for the operation of each motor bus, such policy to be written by an insurance or liability company authorized to carry on business and to write such policies in Ohio; such liability insurance to be acceptable to and approved by the City Attorney before it shall be lawful to operate any such motor busses, and the said liability shall be kept and maintained as hereinafter provided at the amounts herein defined during the whole time of operation of the said motor busses and until every claim against said person, partnership or corporation for injuries or damages or death by wrongful act incurred or suffered by any person or property, other than an employee of the assured, by negligence in the operation of any such motor bus, now in force or which may hereafter be put in force until all claims are completely satisfied. Said liability insurance will contain a provision and condition therein that the insurance and liability company or its local representative shall notify and inform the City of Alliance, Ohio, at least five days before any cancellation of the policy and until such notice is given said provision of the policy shall provide that said liability insurance company is to be and remain fully liable under the terms of the liability insurance. Copy of said policy is to be filed with and kept by the Mayor.

Such liability policy shall contain a further provision that:

A. The insolvency or bankruptcy of the person, partnership or corporation so insured shall not release the insurance company from the payment of damages for injuries sustained, or death by wrongful act, or loss incurred; and in case execution against such insured person, partnership or corporation is returned unsatisfied, in action brought by the insured person or his personal representative, or by any person sustaining damages, because of such insolvency or bankruptcy, then an action may be maintained by the injured person or his personal representative or by any persons entitled to sue for death by wrongful act, against the insurance company direct, under the terms of the policy, for the amount of the judgment in said action, not exceeding the amount of the policy.

B. And the policy may be sued upon at any time provided for by the laws of the State of Ohio.

SECTION 6. ELIGIBILITY OF OPERATORS OF BUSES.

It shall be unlawful for any person, partnership or corporation to allow or permit or cause any motor bus, as herein defined, used in the business specified in this ordinance, to be operated by any person other than a citizen of the United States, over 21 years of age, skilled in the art of driving automobiles and without physical disabilities or personal habits which would disqualify him or make him an unsuitable person from serving as a driver of a public vehicle, and having a sufficient knowledge of the English language to carry on an intelligent conversation.

Names of such operators shall be registered with the Director of Public Safety, and upon approval by him, individual licenses shall be issued to such operator for the calendar year by the Mayor upon the payment of a license fee of \$5.00 each.

SECTION 7. REVOCATION OF LICENSE.

The Mayor may revoke the license of any person to operate any such motor bus, whenever the person so licensed or the persons, partnership or corporation to whom the license or permit has been granted has been convicted for the violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance or infraction of the traffic regulations of said city, or whenever by reason of incompetency, negligence, gross misconduct, or conviction of a felony, the Mayor is of the opinion that in the interest of the public the same should be revoked.

Whenever a license or permit has been revoked, no new license or permit shall be issued to the same person until after the expiration of at least one year.

SECTION 8. SUBJECT TO GENERAL ORDINANCES, ETC.

(a) Every person, partnership or corporation obtaining a license to engage in the motor bus business as defined in this ordinance, and every person,

obtaining a license to operate any such motor bus shall be subject to all of the terms and conditions of this ordinance and to all of the general ordinances of the City of Alliance which are to be enacted, in any manner applicable thereto.

(b) All busses within the terms of this ordinance shall be stopped on signal for the taking on or discharging of passengers only on the opposite or far side of the approaching intersecting street, and not on the near side thereof.

SECTION 9. TAGS TO BE DISPLAYED.

Each motor bus operated under the provisions of this ordinance shall carry constantly displayed upon the same in a conspicuous position the license plate or number as issued by the Mayor. Each driver of such motor bus shall carry such license on his person while engaged in such operation.

SECTION 10. APPEAL.

Any person, partnership or corporation applying for a license to engage in a motor bus business, or any person applying for a license as an operator of a motor bus, under the provisions of this ordinance, shall have a right of appeal from the act of the Mayor in refusing to issue a license in the first instance, or from his order or decision in revoking any license which has been previously issued.

If the Mayor refuses to issue any such license, or if he shall revoke the same after it has been previously issued, he shall notify the applicant in writing by mail or otherwise within ten days after his act of refusing the license, or of revoking the same as the case may be, and the aggrieved party shall have the right to appeal to a board composed of the Director of Public Safety, the Director of Public Service, the City Attorney, the City Auditor and President of Council, which said Board, after full hearing, shall have the power to sustain or modify the decision of the Mayor and to order the license granted, and shall have the power to modify, sustain or reverse the decision of the Mayor in revoking the license, and in either case the decision of the Board shall be final.

The party appealing from the decision of the Mayor shall leave notice in writing of his intention to appeal at the office of the Mayor within ten days after the receipt of said notice from the Mayor.

SECTION 11. INSPECTION OF BUSES.

Buses shall be constructed, and at all times maintained in a safe manner capable of safely carrying the number of passengers that are to be carried, and the means of ingress and egress thereto by doors, steps and otherwise, shall be of such a character so as to permit of easy ingress and egress and shall always be kept in a safe condition, and buses shall be kept in a clean and sanitary condition at all times, all to the satisfaction of the Director of Public Safety.

It shall be the duty of the police officers of the City of Alliance to examine all motor buses and inspect the same from time to time, without notice to any person, partnership or corporation licensed under the provisions of this ordinance, for the purpose of ascertaining whether they are in a safe and sanitary condition.

SECTION 12. PENALTY.

Any person, partnership or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof be fined not less than \$100.00 nor more than \$500.00, and every such violation of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 13.

That all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.

SECTION 14. WHEN TO TAKE EFFECT.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

ORDINANCE NO. 102-E

Mr. Davis:

An Ordinance to levy special assessments for the improvement of West Main Street from Parkway Blvd. to West Corporation line by constructing sanitary sewer 190.

WHEREAS, the City Auditor has on the 18th day of December, 1922 certified to the Council of the City of Alliance as to the estimated life of the property, asset or improvement proposed to be acquired or constructed from the proceeds of the bonds hereinafter referred to as twenty-five years and has further certified the maximum maturity of such bonds as three years.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ALLIANCE, OHIO.

SECTION 1. That to pay the portion of the costs and expenses heretofore determined to be specially assessed for the improvement of West Main Street from Parkway Blvd. to West Corporation line by constructing sanitary sewer No. 190, there be levied and assessed upon the lots and lands the sum of \$_____ per foot front of the property assessed upon said street between the termini of said improvement as above referred to; each of said lots and lands being found by Council and hereby declared to be benefited by said improvement in an amount not less than the assessment hereby levied upon the same.

SECTION 2. That the total assessment against each lot shall be payable in cash within 30 days from the date of the final passage of this ordinance, or in 6 semi-annual installments, with interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum upon deferred payments, at the option of the owner. All cash payments shall be made to the City Treasurer. All installments of assessments shall be certified by the Clerk of Council to the County Auditor on or before the second Monday in September, annually, to be by him placed upon the tax duplicate and collected as other taxes are collected.

SECTION 3. That to provide a fund for the payment of the portion of the cost and expense for which the special assessments herein are levied for the improvement of West Main Street from Parkway Blvd. to West Corporation Line by constructing sanitary sewer No. 190 as aforesaid, the Mayor and Auditor be and they are herein authorized to issue bonds of the City of Alliance in the aggregate sum of Sixteen hundred and Fifty Dollars, payable at the office of the Sinking Fund Trustees, dated December 15th, 1922. Said bonds shall be of the denomination of 3 for \$550.00 and all made payable as follows:

\$ 550.00 September 1st, 1923
550.00 September 1st, 1924
550.00 September 1st, 1925

with interest on said bonds at the rate of 6 per cent per annum payable semi-annually, said bonds to be signed by the aforesaid officers, and sold by them as provided by law, and the proceeds thereof shall be applied to the payment of the cost and expense of said improvements as aforesaid, and to no other purpose whatsoever; and for the payment of said bonds, and the interest thereon, the revenue and faith and all real and personal property of the City of Alliance are hereby pledged; provided that if within the time above specified and before the sale of said bonds any owners of said property shall pay their total assessments in cash, the aggregate sum in bonds to be issued shall be reduced by deducting the amount paid in cash from the total amount of the fund to be provided, and the bonds issued shall be severally reduced in amounts proportionately.

SECTION 4. That upon the sale of said bonds the proceeds thereof, together with the moneys received, if any, from the cash payments of assessments shall be placed in the City Treasury, and disbursed upon proper vouchers in payment of the cost and expense of the improvements aforesaid.

SECTION 5. That the said annual installments and all portions thereof, shall be applied to the payment of said bonds or notes and interest thereon as the same shall become due, and to no other purpose whatsoever.

SECTION 6. There shall be levied and collected annually during the period for which said bonds are to run by taxation on all taxable property on the tax duplicate of the City of Alliance an amount sufficient to pay the interest thereon as herein provided and to provide a sinking fund for the payment of said bond at maturity; provided that the amount of such annual levy shall be such as to provide for and make up any deficiency in the revenues of said City available for the payment of such interest and the creation of such sinking fund, for the collection of said or any special assessment hereafter levied in lieu thereof, or otherwise; and the proper taxing authorities shall compute the amount of such general tax levies and certify the same for collection as other taxes are certified and collected.

SECTION 7. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

ORDINANCE NO. 94-E ¹²⁶

Mr. Davis:

An ordinance providing rules and regulations governing the installation of electrical wiring for light, heat and power, in all buildings within the City of Alliance, Ohio.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ALLIANCE, STATE OF OHIO:

SECTION ONE: That all electrical wiring for light, heat and power shall be of such construction and so installed and maintained as to reduce the life and fire hazard as far as possible.

All wiring for light, heat or power shall meet the requirements of the National Electric Code.

All fittings and devices used shall be approved by the Underwriters Laboratory or Bureau of Standards.

All electrical equipment shall comply with this ordinance when placed in service, and shall thereafter be maintained in a safe condition. Defective wiring or equipment shall at the discretion of the City Electrical Inspector or Chief of Fire Department, be put in good order or permanently disconnected.

Repairs, extensions and changes made to existing equipment shall be done by properly qualified persons only. All such work shall be inspected by the City Electrical Inspector before being put into service.

All wiring for light, heat or power in what is known as the Fire District, described in the City Building Code, shall be entirely in approved metallic conduit, or metal moulding, or approved armored cable, installed according to the National Electric Code.

All wiring for light, heat or power in public buildings such as Schools, Hospitals, Churches, Hotels, Dance Halls and dwelling houses intended for more than two (2) families, factories, warehouses, feedstores, livery stables, garages (where more than two (2) machines are kept) and in buildings of fireproof construction, shall be in approved metallic conduit, metal moulding, or approved armored cable, installed according to the National Electric Code.

All new wiring done in buildings of the above classes shall be installed as provided herein and the City Electrical Inspector or Chief of Fire Department may at their discretion require all wiring in the building to conform to this ordinance before allowing alterations or additions to be made.

In installations outside of the Fire District and in buildings not classed as above, concealed "knob and tube" work will be permitted when it complies with the National Electric Code.

SERVICE ENTRANCES

SECTION TWO: That all service entrances must be run in approved metallic conduit of the size specified in the National Electric Code for the wires to be carried. This conduit must terminate in an approved inclosed "safety" switch, with handle to operate from the outside. This switch must be placed in the nearest readily accessible place to where the wires enter the building.

One service only for each class of service, namely: light, heat, power, flat rate, shall be run to each building, except "Emergency" lights for Theatres. This prohibits running separate services to each floor and provides one point to cut off all electric current in each building in case of fire.

All buildings wired for more than one meter must have a three wire service and an inclosed externally operated switch provided on this service as well as on each meter.

GROUNDS

SECTION THREE: That each service conduit and switch box must be grounded. The neutral wire of the line must be grounded.

The system of conduit in the house must be grounded.

Each of the above must be grounded separately, except that the house system ground may be omitted, where the house system is properly bonded to the service conduit or switch box.

ORDINANCE NO. 94-E (continued)

The ground conductor must be of copper and must be continuous from conduit or box to the street side of the water meter, except as provided below. The size of this conductor shall be at least #8 B. & S. gage.

This conductor must be supported in an approved manner and protected from mechanical injury.

If metallic conduit is used for protection, this conduit shall not be used as conductor for either ground. However, there must be another ground run from the end of this protecting conduit to the water pipe.

In case of no water in the building at least two ground rods shall be driven, - one for the neutral ground and one for the conduit ground. These ground rods shall not be connected together and must be kept at least five (5) feet apart.

In special cases due to the inaccessibility of the water meter, two ground rods may be driven; in very exceptional cases the grounds may be made at other points on the water line than at the meter. For these cases, special permission must be obtained before any work is done.

FUSES AND SWITCHES

SECTION FOUR: That all fuses must be inclosed in approved metal boxes, approved panel or distribution boxes.

Switches must operate so that when the switch is in the off position the fuses will be "dead."

Replacement of fuses with pennies or other metallic substances is absolutely prohibited. However, in case of the neutral wire, the fuse may be omitted and a solid piece of copper wire permanently fastened in its place.

Meters, switches and fuses shall not be placed directly under water pipes or nearer in any direction than 18 inches.

All wiring in basements, rooms with cement, tile or earthen floors, when not in rigid iron conduit, must have all fixtures, switches and sockets of porcelain or other non-absorbent insulating material.

All drop lights, portable hand or trouble lamps, when used on cement, tile or earthen floors, or in and around boilers or other grounded bodies, shall be made up of wire equivalent to "Brewery Cord," and have a porcelain or composition socket. All portable hand or trouble lamps must, in addition to the above, have approved lamp guards.

All transformers and substation equipment installed indoors must be placed in a special fireproof vault well ventilated to the outside and shut off from the rest of the building by approved fire doors.

There must be a permanent sewer connection to this vault and the floor must drain to one point and sewer connection of at least four (4) inch pipe from there through a trap.

INSPECTIONS

SECTION FIVE: That the City Electrical Inspector, or his authorized deputy shall make a thorough inspection of each and every job before the service is rendered. He shall keep a permanent record in his office at the City Hall and shall furnish the lighting or power company with a certificate of inspection and no service shall be rendered until this certificate is turned in.

Any building with service disconnected shall be re-inspected and no service shall be rendered until this certificate is turned in.

Any building with service disconnected shall be reinspected before service is re-established.

The City Electrical Inspector, may, after due inspection, order service discontinued until such time as all wiring is put in safe condition.

The charge for inspection shall be as follows:

For all new work, "roughing in" - 10-15 outlets or less	\$1.00
15-25 " " "	1.50
Each outlet exceeding 25 outlets	.05
For final inspection - \$1.00 for first ten (10) sockets;	
.05 for each socket exceeding ten	
and up to twenty-five (25);	
.02 for each above twenty-five.	
For inspection of old installation	\$.50
For service only	1.00

Motor installations

Each motor .05 per H. P. with a minimum charge of \$1.00 per motor.

Extension to old equipment:

1 - light	.35
1 - 4 lights, each	.25
4 - 10 lights	1.00
10 - lights or over, each	.10

When the inspector is called for final inspection, and finds the job incomplete, or of faulty construction, he shall collect the fee for final inspection, and then each additional trip necessary, until the final certificate is issued, shall be subject to a charge of .50¢.

SECTION SIX: That any person or persons, firm or corporation found guilty of the violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be fined not less than Twenty-five Dollars nor more than Three Hundred Dollars, or imprisoned in the Stark County Work House for more than six months, or both.

SECTION SEVEN: That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.
