 imposed according to the following letter.

Treasury Department
 Washington July 18th 1922
 Postmaster, Custodian of Site
 Alliance, Ohio

Sir,

This office is in receipt of your
 communication of the 16th instant, wherein
 you transmit the letter addressed you,
 under date of the 16th instant, by the
 Clerk of the Council, of Alliance, Ohio,
 in which he states that he is directed
 to ascertain from you, if it would
 be possible to secure the ground
 owned by the United States Government
 at the corner of Arch and Market
 streets, for the use of a playground
 for children of the city of Alliance, O.

In reply, you are requested to inform
 the proper city authorities that, if
 written application is made to the
 Department by the City officials for
 the use of the Federal building site
 in question, as a public playground
 for the children of said city, said
 application will be given due
 consideration. The city authorities
 should be further advised that they
 will be required to be responsible
 for the condition of the ground, for the
 regulation and conduct while thereon,
 that the Government can not be involved
 in any expense thereby, that no
 structure can be erected on said tract
 without obtaining the written assent
 of the Department thereto. That upon
 receipt of written notice from the Secretary
 of the Treasury requiring such action,
 they will be required to remove all
 gymnasia etc placed thereon by the
 city authorities and must leave the
 grounds in a condition satisfactory
 to you, all without expense to
 the United States.
