Voss moved, seconded by Farmer that the Commissioners President appoint a committee to meet with the County Commissioners and go over the matter with them.

A representative of the Buckeye Pipe Line Co. was present and addressed council relative to a notice served on that company as lessee of certain lands being appropriated by the city for the Westville Storage Reservoir.

He submitted a drawing showing that their pipe lines would not be affected by this reservoir according to the boundaries given in said notice.

The following ordinance and resolution were taken up and considered.

Ord. No. 1592

Mr. Yarnum. An ordinance regulating automobiles, motor cycles, bicycles, power trucks, except street cars, upon the streets, alleys, avenues and public places in the city of Alliance, Ohio.

Farmer moved, seconded by Voss that Section (7) be amended by omitting the clause "operating to Main Street" so as to make apply to all parts of the city.

The question being on agreeing to the motion The Yeas and Nays were taken and resulted Yeas 4. Nays 2. Those who voted in the affirmative were.

Messrs. Baird, Farmer, Gower, Voss. Messrs. Gubb, Yarnum voted in the negative.

So the motion was agreed to and the ordinance amended.

Yarnum moved, seconded by Voss that Section 9 be amended by striking out the last clause relating to owners of garages keeping the ordinance posted in their garage.
