Dear Sir:

It is obviously the imperative duty of our council to carry out the will of our citizens by introducing and passing the necessary legislation to provide \$15,000.00 on the best possible terms to erect a municipal electric plant as requested by the voters in the recent election, and to prosecute the work with reasonable speed in order that it can be used to demonstrate the economy of a larger plant competent to furnish all the electric current required by the city and its citizens for all purposes, and to gain this information before the expiration of its present contract with the Gas. Power Co. It is difficult to believe that our council of seven persons will refuse to obey the mandate of a large majority of 16,000 people as indicated at the election, and I therefore trust that they will get busy on the job with a view of early and satisfactory installation and operation of the electric plant as requested by the voters.

Ord. No. 1609

Mr. Patton. To issue bonds for the purpose of erecting works for the generation and transmission of electricity to the City of Alliance, O, and the inhabitants thereof, for illuminating and power purposes. was read the first time.

Patton moved. seconded. by Lower that the statutory rule requiring ordinance and resolutions to be read on three different days be suspended and the ordinance read the second and third time

The question being on the suspension of the rule.

The Yeas and Nays were taken and resulted Yeas 4 Nays 3

Those who voted in the affirmative were Messrs. Barnard, Farmer, Shubb, Lower, Patton.

Those who voted in the negative were Messrs. Farmer, Voss, Jamney

So the rule not having received the necessary $\frac{3}{4}$ vote was lost.

Res. No. 1580

Mr Farmer. Declaring it necessary to improve Union Avenue between the N. Line of Vine Street and the N. Corporation line by grading, draining, curbing and paving. was read the first time.

Farmer moved seconded by Yarnsey that D.M. Armstrong and H.B. Haygood be appointed a committee and they to select a third to appraise the lots abutting on the Union Ave. improvement between Vine St. and the N Corporation line.

Which motion was agreed to.

Mr Milo Cathon addressed council on the subject of a street carnival to be held by the Lodge No 362. I.O.O.M. the week beginning July 7th 1913.

Mr Patton introduced Res No 362. I.O.O.M. To grant to Lodge No 362. I.O.O.M. the right to hold a carnival on East Main Street in the City of Chicago during the week beginning July 7th and ending July 12th 1913.

Lower moved seconded by Farmer that the amount of bond be fixed at \$300.00

Which motion was agreed to.

Voss moved seconded by Farmer that the resolution be adopted.

The Yeas and Nays were taken and resulted Yeas 7 Nays 0. Those who voted in the affirmative were Messrs. Barnard, Farmer, Gubb, Lower, Patton, Voss, Yarnsey.

So the resolution was adopted.

On motion of Yarnsey. Council adjourned.
