Mr. Lower To issue bonds for the purpose of purchasing an automobile triple combination pumping engine for the Fire Department of the City of Alliance Ohio, was read the second time.

Resolution No 1625

To grant to The Alliance-Spring Central Labor Body the right to the use of the streets, alleys and other public places of the City of Alliance, for Labor Day celebration, Monday, September 1st, 1913.

Res No. 1636

Mr Yanner, Whereas, certain bonds, of the City of Alliance, Ohio, to wit, \$5,000.00 - 5% - Sidewalks Bonds. Issued for the construction and repair of the necessary sidewalks, curbing and gutters or parts thereof. Dated June 1st 1913, Maturing \$1500.00 Sept. 1st 1914, \$1500.00 September 1st - 1915, \$1500.00, Sept 1st 1916, were advertised for sale for thirty days in two newspapers of general circulation in County where such municipal corporation is situated setting forth the nature, amount, rate of interest and length of time the bonds have to run with time and place of sale. Said bids were received Friday July 18th 1913, and whereas no satisfactory bids were received.

Therefore be it resolved that the Mayor, City Auditor and Finance Committee are hereby authorized to sell said bonds at private sale for not less than par and accrued interest. was read the first time.
