Dear Sir,

Confirming conversation with you of recent date in regard to paving South Mahoning Ave. from the pavement already laid south to State St. we wish to confirm the proposition made to you. That the Alliance Clay Product Co. would furnish good suitable block such as we have furnishing for the street of Alliance sufficient to complete the pavement the width of that already laid on South Mahoning Ave. free of all cost whatsoever to the city. That we further agree to load said block on to the wagon at our factory the same as we serve regular Contractors engaged in Street Pavement.

The only condition that we would impose upon the City of Alliance if they choose to accept this proposition would be that the block should be well and mechanically laid on a concrete foundation with a sand cushion with either cement or stone curb and that portion of the street be paved in the year 1914, where there is no fill, made knowing that the condition of the street is such that it would be impracticable to pave where the fill is made until a year after the grade is completed.

Our proposition speaks for itself how anxious we are to have this street properly improved. Trusting that this will meet with your approval we remain,

Dear Mr. Gubb,

At a recent meeting of the official Board of the Union Avenue M.E. Church there was discussed the lights about which I appeared before the Council some time ago to request that they be furnished for the front of the church. At that time, my understanding was that the council would maintain the light after it was once installed at our expense. By this I refer to the replacing of broken globes, lamps, etc. It seems that this was not included in the resolution as passed and at the request of the Official Board, I would ask that you present this matter to the Council at their next meeting and see whether it would be possible for the lights to be maintained at the city's expense in addition to furnishing the current equal to a 100 watt lamp. In case it is not possible to secure this, the Official Board would like to have a single light such as you are placing at street corners, placed on the post at the corner of Union Avenue and Hailshorn Street.

The same has been graded and sewered and we are now paying assessment for the same, and that being only about half paid. We give as a further reason that only about one half of the lots between Union Avenue and Lincoln Avenue, are occupied or have houses built upon them.
