

Sept 21st 1914 -
The council met pursuant to adjournment
in the Central Fire station with President Ross
in the chair.

The roll being called the following members

The minutes of the previous meeting was
read and approved.

Harry Huss address council regarding the
contemplated improvement for the Sewage
Disposal Plant. He stated that if
conditions were to continue he and
other citizens would go to court.

Charles Bammun address council regarding
the Westville Reservoir, and advocated
the abandonment of the reservoir and
take the money for improvement
to the water works near the
old dam site.

City Solicitor Morris called attention
of council to the proposed legislation
to eliminate street fakir from
the city streets. He said this
could not be done unless all sale
from the streets were eliminated.

This of course the solicitor said
would not eliminate the huckster
who grew or produced his own
goods.

The law does not prevent
you from selling the product of
your own labors anywhere.
It would stop the sale of produce
that was shipped in and handled
for speculation.

On motion of Cathon, seconded by
Knowles, the council decided to
visit the Westville Reservoir
Thursday September 24th 1914

A transcript of the proceedings of the

These subscriptions were made on conditions that the road be graded its entire width and paved to the width of sixteen feet on the west side of the center line.

At the time that these subscriptions were taken it was expected that the road would be promptly completed this fact, and as the Alliance Clay Product Company is guaranteeing these subscriptions in order to make it possible for them to do so we would make it a condition that the road be completed at the earliest time possible in 1915, that would permit of economical and good construction.

 Fund which is now in the City
 Treasury and amounts to \$500.00
 more or less and can be applied
 toward liquidating the balance
 due from the city. We are
 turning over to the city accounts
 receivable amounting to \$3,888.87
 and it will be therefore seen that
 the city will only have to
 collect a small proportion of
 these accounts in order to
 reimburse itself for the amount
 necessary to pay to the Association
 to liquidate the outstanding
 accounts now payable.
