The husband's testimony was that his wife  
refused to wash dishes; that she took their  
infant to the tailor shop where he worked  
for him to take care of it, and when he re-  
fused to do so she tied it to a pump in the  
street and left it. The wife alleges that her  
husband kissed the girls in the shop and at  
one time held Annie Geisler and herself on  
his knees at the same time. She did not  
care for this when done in fun, but did most  
emphatically when in earnest.

A divorce was granted in the case of Ellen  
Highlands against Alexander Highlands for  
desertion. A suit for divorce was entered  
by Elizabeth Lucas against Scott R. Lucas.  
The plaintiff says they were married on Feb-  
ruary 4, 1880, and that he has since imposed  
certain indignities upon her, compelling her  
to do manual labor. Suit was also entered  
by Sarah Jane Lintz against George W.  
Lintz for divorce. H. T. Watson was ap-  
pointed commissioner in the case of Ida J.  
Mullen against Joseph Mullen, and D. R.
