The following communication was received and read:

Alliance, Ohio, April 19th, 1915.

To the Members of The Council of the City of Alliance:

We, The Alliance Garbage Company, of the City of Alliance, beg leave to submit the following proposition for the removal and disposal of garbage in the City of Alliance.

- First: That the present ordinance be not repealed.
Second: That it be so amended or modified that the contract can be let for Five years.
Third: That the price be not limited to ten cents per can if a long haul must be made.
Fourth: That we will establish an office within the city with a clerk present from 8 A.M. until 4 P.M.
Fifth: We will furnish everyone who may desire service a good water-tight can made of galvanized iron.
Sixth: We respectfully ask this Council to erect and maintain a garbage disposal plant, within the corporate limits of the City of Alliance, or as near to the City as is consistent with good sanitary conditions.
Seventh: We agree to furnish a bond of \$1000 if given a contract or franchise.

Mr. A. A. Kelly addressed Council on the proposed improvement of Grant Street, speaking in opposition to the improvement.

The following resolution was introduced:

Resolution declining trust imposed upon the City by will of George Snode.

Whereas one George Snode died on the 23rd day of March, 1913, leaving a will, the second item of which is as follows:—"I will and bequeath to the Trustees of the Alliance Cemetery \$500.00, the interest of which shall be perpetually used for flowers to be placed at the grave of my deceased wife, Sophia Snode, and for the expense of keeping said lot in proper condition", said will having been admitted to probate by the Probate Court of Mahoning County on April 22, 1913:

And whereas it appears from the City records that said cemetery lot had already been endowed at the time of the death of said George Snode, which endowment under the provisions of the deed for said lot requires the city of Alliance to perpetually keep said lot in proper condition:

And whereas it will impose an undesirable burden and additional expense upon the City to execute the trust imposed upon it by said will, inasmuch as the city will be compelled to invest the money to open a separate account on its books, to purchase flowers and place them on the grave and to remove them, and can use no part of the income of said bequest to compensate itself for administering the trust:

And whereas a daughter of the deceased has expressed the desire to perform the service of keeping said grave in condition and of placing flowers thereon:

And whereas the matter has come before the Council upon the application of David Fording, attorney for J. M. Snode, executor of the estate of said George Snode, asking the City of Alliance to elect whether it will accept or decline said trust:

Knowles moved, seconded by Cathon, that the Council decline to accept the trust imposed upon it by said will by reasons set forth in the above resolution, and that the Solicitor be instructed to notify the executor of said estate of said action, which motion was agreed to.

Statement of City Auditor concerning E. State St. Improvement.

City Auditor, G. O. Silver, called Council's attention to the East State Street improvement, stating that the City's Portion Bonds for this improvement had been authorized, and certain agreements by outside parties paying a portion of this improvement had not been entered into. He suggested that the matter be taken up at once and signed agreements be executed and filed before further proceedings be taken in regard to this improvement.

Cathon moved, seconded by Barnard, that the City Solicitor be requested to take up at once with the Highways Commission at Columbus, Ohio, and ascertain if they were ready with their portion of this improvement, which motion was agreed to.

Grant Street between Arch and Liberty Avenues, Vincent Street between Aultman and Union Avenues, was read the first time.
