

Monday, April 26, 1915.

The Council met in adjourned session with President Reeves in the chair.

The roll being called, the following members answered to their names: Messrs. Barnard, Binkley, Cathon, Grubb, Heidman, Knowles, Ryan. Present 7, Absent 0.

Matter of paying claim of extra cook and maid at Hospital.

City Auditor Silver called Council's attention to the employment of an extra cook and maid at the City Hospital last November, and stated that the employment of this help was contracted not in accordance with the Ordinance as passed by Council and as recommended by the Board of Control, and were not legal claims against the City; but should be paid, however, as moral obligations, as the services had been rendered, and the party employing this help has left the City.

On motion of Heidman, seconded by Binkley, the Auditor was instructed to prepare an Ordinance authorizing the payment of these bills.

Statements concerning Armory Site.

City Solicitor Morris stated that in his judgement the traffic ordinance ought to be amended, eliminating the imprisonment clause so that the accused might ask for jury trial.

He also stated that he had recently been in Columbus conferring with the State Armory Board with regard to the transfer of the Hester lot.

Knowles presented to Council a letter from the State Armory Board concerning the Armory site.

Damages to Property of Mr. Wise considered.

Attorney E. P. Speidel appeared before Council to urge some action relative to the Wise property on Walnut Avenue.

He stated that the City had taken about half the lot for street improvements, and that Mr. Wise's house is about ready to fall, and asked damages in the sum of \$1,000.00: or to have the house moved to some other lot.

The matter was referred to the Building and Assessments Committee, and the Engineer.


