Binkley asked information as to the number of building permits issued during the year.

Mayor Westover stated that he had requested a list of plumbing inspections, to go after those who had failed to secure building permits.

It was the opinion that no inspection should be made until the proper building permit had been issued.

Grubb suggested that it would be well to have a card placed on each house during its construction, stating that a building permit had been issued.

Merts moved that the Solicitor be requested to prepare proper legislation to cover the subject, and that the Plumbing Inspector be authorized to refuse to inspect the building until the required building permit had been secured. The Solicitor was instructed to draft an ordinance to this effect.

On motion of Binkley, the Plumbing Inspector was instructed to so act until the legislation was enacted.
